

Farmington Hills Harrison won its second straight city championship in the annual Observer volleyball tournament Monday. The Hawks had to win a threegame match with Farmington and snuff a North Farmington rally to retain the title.

Hopefully, Farmington Hills Harrison volleyball coach Ron Shortt tried to work out a 2-for-1 deal with the en-

Shortt didn't realize until he was preparing for this year's Observer city tournament the champlonable Harrison won last year was never inscribed on the traveling trophy.

No problem since the trophy won't be traveling this year. It was still with the engraver when the host Hawks won again Monday night.

"Instead of picking it up, I'll just call and say 'Hey, do it again," Shortt said.

It was the third time Harrison has won the title. The Hawks ended North Farmington's four-year hold on the championship last year.

Harrison had a tough time with Farmington in the first 'game 15-4, the Hawks lost the next one 13-15 and prevailed 15-12 in the third.

"We came out like gangbusters, and I thought we were going to take them in two," Shortt said. "In the second game, they played better and we started making unforced errors. We got a lead in the third and lung on."

After the Falcons defeated North in two games (15-10, 15-10), Harrison clinched the champlonship with 15-6, 15-8 victories over the Raiders.

None of the teams was at the top of its game after a long day of competition Saturday in the West Bloomlield Invitational, according to Shortt. The Hawks had an emotional, come-frombehind win over Mount Clemens Chippewa Valley in the final match to clinch third place.

"Tonight it could have been anybody's game,' he said. "I know all the kids were a little tired. I imagine all

Harrison (9-4-3) was represented on the all-tournament team by mid-dle hitter Julie Heist and setter/ hitter Amanda Ault and defensive specialist Lori Hubble.

"It's been a real good two years and right now we're playing with only one senior," Shortt said. "But it's Julio and she's going to be tough to replace."

Farmington, which finished last a year ago, came close to winning the tournament after starting slowly.
