

Temple Israel hosts wine tasting fund-raiser

Temple Israel's annual wine tasting fund-raiser is more than a simple cheese and fruit spread. About 1,000 people are expected to attend Saturday to sample over 100 varieties of wine and delve into specialties created by some of the area's best chefs.

One Charlevox restaurant also will be catering to its West Bloomfield clientele, some 200 miles away, when it serves up its Michigan white fish strudel at the Walnut Lake Road synagogue near Drake.

More than 40 restaurants are on the menu, including Tapawingo's of Charlevoix, Chef Milos' Golden Mushroom and Brian Polcyn's three eateries, Aca-

dia, Pike's Street and Chimayo.

Temple Israel's plan to tempt the community's taste buds is all in the name of a good time — and to benefit a spectacular event that starts where all the other events of its kind stop," said Richard Gershenson, fund-raiser chairman. "It's a big time major league and it's gotten bigger every year."

About 1,000 people are expected to attend the fifth annual event. Last year the fund-raiser grossed \$76,000, according to Suskin.

Radio, computer show comes to Southfield

Swappers and shoppers are gearing up for one of the largest high tech swap meets in the Midwest.

And it's held nearby in Southfield.

The hallways and cafeterias at Southfield High School were filled with the newest and oldest — in radio and computer equipment Sunday at the school's annual "Southfield High School Amateur Radio Club Swap and Shop and Computer Fest."

Some 3,000 to 4,000 people are expected to attend the event, which has been coordinated through its 27-year history by veteran Southfield High electronics teacher Bob Younker, a Livonia resident.

Younker said the show is "the biggest one east of the Mississippi" and attracts people from all over Southeast Michigan, Ohio, Indiana and Illinois and vendors ranging everywhere from Wisconsin to New York. It is held each year on the third Sunday of January.

"It's just gotten bigger and bigger every year," said Younker who started the swap meet at the request of former student Arnie Podolsky, who still comes back to attend the show almost every year. Younker said about 1,500 people attend the event from Southfield and surrounding Oakland County communities, about

1,000 from the Livonia area and another 500 from Redford Township.

The show is scheduled for 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. Sunday, Jan. 17, with vendors allowed in at 6 a.m. But Younker said often attendees line up to get into the show that early.

Not only has Younker been involved for years, but his students have taken an active role as well. Past graduates including Randy Beard, Brandon Horda, Alex Novacek, Scott Bernan, Darin Gray, Brad Jackson and Martin Holmes all act as an executive committee coordinating such things as security, food service and coordinating vendor space for the show.

About 30 current students, many who are members of the radio club, also lend a hand to the event, where about 400 tables of vendors peddle new wares or look for things to swap.

"We have half a mile of hallways" in Southfield High School, Younker explained. "We use all of those, plus two cafeterias. It's end-to-end throughout the whole building on the first floor."

They charge \$15 per vendor table and a per-head fee of \$4 at the door to attend the show. The school earns an average of about \$20,000 per year from the show, which is sponsored by the Southfield High School Amateur Radio Club. The money is used to buy equipment for the school and funds scholarships for students getting into the electronics field.

An Ordinance to amend the City Code, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, of the City of Farmington Hills, to amend Section 34.32 to reclassify certain property as hereinafter mentioned:

The City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, hereby ordains:

Section 1. That the City Code of the City of Farmington Hills, Chapter 34, Zoning Chapter, is hereby amended in part to amend Section 34.32 to reclassify certain property in the City as follows to show RA-3, One-Family Residential District classification where OS-1, Office Service District classification is now shown in the area described as follows:

No. 23-33-476-017 & 018; No. 23-33-430-038 & 039
TIN, R9E, Section 35, City of Farmington Hills, Oakland County, Michigan, Part of Lots 26 and 27 of Farmington Acres Subdivision, commonly known as 33555, 33501, 33456 and 33440 Kirby Avenue.

Section 2. All ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed only to the extent necessary to give this Ordinance full force and effect.

Section 3. The provisions of this Ordinance are hereby ordered to take effect twenty-one days after their enactment.

Section 4. This Ordinance is hereby declared to have been adopted by the Council Members of the City of Farmington Hills, at a duly called meeting held on the 11th day of January, 1993, and ordered to be given publication in the manner prescribed by law.
