

Shamrocks rout Chargers, 7-0

The puck was bouncing the right way Saturday night for Redford Catholic Central.

The host Shamrocks broke away from a scoreless first period to tally seven unanswered goals en route to a 7-0 victory over Livonia Churchill in a non-league hockey game at the Redford Ice Arena.

"When you work hard and hustle to the puck, you make things happen," said CC coach Jack Gumbleton, whose team is 8-1-2 overall. "I told them (after the first period) that they were not going in for rebounds, and that you have to hustle and skate."

Junior forward Jon Heady was the catalyst for state-ranked CC, breaking the ice with an unassisted goal at 2:32 of the second period. He finished the night with five

points on a goal and four assists.

Before the period was concluded, CC tacked up three more goals on the board, two by junior line-mate Frank Novock and one by Justin Ronayne on a power-play.

Novock also finished the evening with five points on two goals and three assists.

Mike Giordano added a pair of goals, a backhand (power-play) and a tip-in during the final period. Ronayne, a senior forward, capped the scoring with 8:10 left.

Senior defenseman Brian Ronayne also figured prominently in the scoring, assisting on a pair of goals. Mark Holdridge also drew an assist.

"I thought we beat Churchill to the puck," Gumbleton said. "And we played it smart. I think we played less selfish than we have in the past."

"We had some good opportuni-

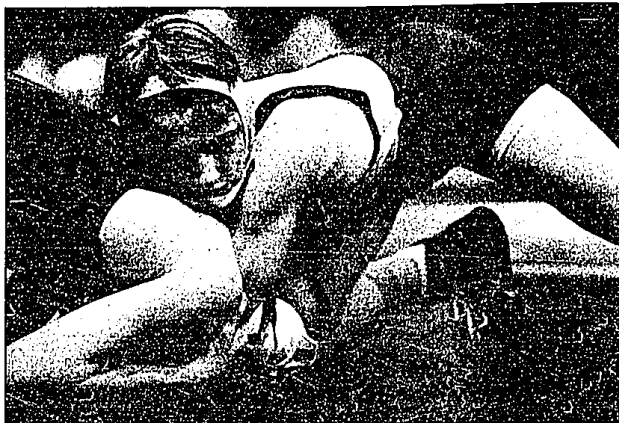
ties in the first period and I felt it was only a matter of time before we got on the board."

It was a dismal showing for the Chargers, who fell to 6-5-1 overall. They came in with high hopes after losing 3-2 to the Shamrocks on Jan. 8 at Livonia's Edgar Arena.

"CC played an excellent game and they played with purpose," Churchill first-year coach Jeff Hatley said. "They skated well and they skated hard."

The Chargers managed only 17 shots on goal against CC senior goaltender Jamie Ronayne, who went all the way to post the shut-out.

Meanwhile, Churchill senior goalie Dave Watson, who kept the Shamrocks off the board with some timely saves in the opening period, had little support during the final 30 minutes of action.

Western trio stars in wrestling tourney

Walled Lake Western has a trio of wrestlers who harbor legitimate state championship hopes. The Big Three demonstrated their talents in convincing style Saturday in the annual West Bloomfield Invitational.

The lightweight Fritz brothers — Andy and Rob — captured the 103- and 112-pound titles, respectively. Middleweight Travis Ilacqua easily handled his 145-pound match against Rochester's Rob Sacka in the only championship final involving two Eccentric-area competitors.

Those three wrestlers, combined with placement efforts from both Pat McCloy (second at 130) and Jason Burchum (fourth at 171), allowed Western to finish second in the team standings.

Roseville, one of only two Macomb County teams in the 17-

team tournament, captured the title for the second time in three years with 130 points. Western was next with 123½ points followed by Rochester at 118½.

Ferndale (112½) and Belleville (110½) rounded out the top five. Farmington Harrison was ninth, Orchard Lake St. Mary's 10th and West Bloomfield 14th.

Western coach Dick Watson was a picture of satisfaction after his team's fine overall showing.

"When I looked at the list of teams that were going to be here, I didn't think we'd be able to take second place," said Watson. "I was very pleased with the effort. We even had a chance to win it."

"Considering the team I expected to have didn't materialize this year, the guys did a great job. We have five seniors on the team and they are providing great leadership."
