Senior defenseman Brian Ronayne also figured prominently in the scoring, assisting on a pair of goals. Mark Holdridge also drew an assist.


I though Gumbleton said, "and we buy the goals of the property of the past," Gumbleton said, "and we buy of less selfish than we have in the past.
