(Explanation of Proposition)

The following millage proposition authorizes the renewal and the continued levy of previously approved millages, a part of which has recently expired and a part of which is still authorized, to become effective as the existing millages expire.

MILLAGE PROPOSITION
Shall the limitation on the amount of taxes which may be assessed against all property in Farmington Public School District, Oakland County, Michigan, for operating purposes, be increased and continued for levy in the amounts and for the years as follows:

- a. by 4.3155 mills (\$4.3155 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation, for the years 1993 through 2001, inclusive (this is a renewal of the millage which expired with the 1992 tax levy);
- b. by 4.3155 mills (\$4.3155 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation for the years 1994 through 2001, inclusive (this is a renewal of the millage which will expire with the 1993 tax levy); and
- c. by 3.4524 mills (\$3.4524 on each \$1,000.00) on state equalized valuation, for the years 1995 through 2001, inclusive (this is a renewal of the millage which will expire with the 1994 tax levy)?
