Hockey scouts like Observerland



The area of southeastern Michigan that is part of the Observer & Eccentric coverage has become a gold mine for professional scouts searching for prospective National Hockey League players.

When you think of hotbeds of hockoy talont, you think Canada. You
think Windser, To-ronto and those
obscure-sounding places like Medicine Hat and Moose Jaw.

If you think United States, you
might think Minnesota or Minsachusette or upstate New York. It would
probably be a while before you got
around to thinking about the Observor & Eccentric area.

around to thinking about the Observ-er & Eccentric area.
Well, think again.
"When you look at the quality of the players produced in this area, it's really unbelievable," said Craig But-ton, the director of amateur scouting

for the Minnesota North Stars. "This area produces more quality players than any other area in the U.S. I'm from Montreal, but the North Stars asked me to move here (Ypailanti) three years ago because the depth and breadth of hockey talent is as good." The area Button is talking about is southeastern Michigan. And whon he liast the great players from this area he includes the likes of Pat Lafontine (Waterford), John Vanblestrouck (Detroit), Craig Wolanin (Grosse Pointe), Kevin and Kelly Miller (Lansing) and Kevin and Derinn Hatcher (Sterling Heights) and Jimmy Carson (Grosse Pointe).

Still, the largest concentration of

talent in southeastern Michigan comes from the 12-community O&E area. There are now 23 players from the O&E area playing professional hockey, nine in the NHL.

The nine are: Adam Burt from Westland (Hartford); Mike Donnelly from Livonia (Los Angeles); Mike Hartman from West Eloomfield (Tampa Bay; Al Idrate from Livonia (Washington); Todd Krygler from Northville (Washington); Mike Modano from Livonia (Minnesota); Chris Tanelli from Livonia (Detroll); Mark Howe from Lathruy Viliage (Detroll); and Rich Kromm from Livonia (New York Islanders).

"That's quite an gecomplishment

"That's quite an accomplishment for an area in the U.S.," said Chris Coury, a Red Wings scout and the general manager of the Little Caesars' AAA elite hockey pragram. "You tak a place in Canada like Toronto and

you have a quarter of a million kids playing hockey. There's almost as many kida playing hockey in Toronto as there are in the entire U.S. So to have that many quality players come out of one area like that is really im-pressive."

System breeds quality

System breeds quality

It's not difficult to see why this area produces such a high quality and quantity of hockey talent. The steps up the ladder of success are all securely in place. They need only to be climbed.

"There is a good system in place here and excellent facilities for development," Coury said. "It all starts with the local associations and the communities really do a good job of getting them started and getting them exposed to the game."

Salem denies Farmington cage upset

Farmington envisioned an upset Friday night, but unbeaten Plymouth Salem refused to go down in a West-run Lakes Activitice Association basketball game.

The No. 6-ranked Rocks overcame a fast start by the Falcons and weathered a second-half rally to defect visiting Farmington 71-57.

Salem improved to 3-0 in the WLAA and 9-0 overall. The Falcons are 2-1 and 5-4.

"Every game is a battle because we're up there in the rankings and undefeated," Salem coach Bob Brodie sid. "People are going to come after us hard."

Farmington jumped in front 11-4,

but the Rocks scored the next 10 points to take the lead. Salem led 16-13 after one quarter and 37-25 at half-

13 after one quarter and 37-26 at half-time.

The Rocks expanded their lead to
49-25 in the third quarter, but Farm-ington narrowed the gap to seven points (64-47) before Salem regained control in the least three minutes.

"We felt good about the fact bung in there," Farmington coach Denny Mikel said. "Early in the third quarter, we could have folded up and got blown out real bad.

"We felt we were going to be able to come in here, surprise them and win his one. It's been awhile since Farm-ington basketball felt positive about games. That's a tribute to the play-

Salem led 22-20 in the second
