**REDFORD CC 72, NOTRE DAME 57:** Senior forward Brian Paluk scored 14 of his game-high 23 points in the second half Friday to break a 27-27 halftime tie and give visiting Redford Catholic Central its second straight win in the Catholic League Central Division.

The two teams were tied 46-46 after three quarters before the Shamrocks outscored ND 26-11 in the fourth quarter. The win leaves CC at 4-5 overall, 2-2 in the Central Division.

ND is 5-4 overall and winless in four Central Division games.

## No. 3 Shamrocks beat No. 2 South

It looks like Redford Catholic Central will get to trade places with Grosse Pointe South in this week's Class A state boys hockey rankings.

CC, No. 3 last week, defeated No. 2 South, 5-3, in a Michigan Metro Hockey League game played Saturday at Redford Ice Arena.

Trenton, another Metro League member, will likely remain atop the Class A rankings, with CC moving up to No. 2 and South dropping to No. 3. The Shamrocks, who led 3-0 before the game was four minutes old, improved to 3-1-1 in the Metro and 9-1-2 overall.

South falls to 10-1 overall, 4-1 in the Metro.

"This means to us that we know where we fit in, that we have a chance," CC coach Jack Gumbelton said. "We were fired up, moving very quickly and were ready for this game. The team put on a marquee performance."

Frank Novock, Jeff Helner, Ken Lauer, Brian Ronayne and Jon Heady scored goals for the Shamrocks, and defenseman Mike Kasper had three assists. Novock gave the Shamrocks a 1-0 lead with a power-play goal at the 2:00 mark of the first period, assisted by Kasper and Brian Ronayne.

CC made it 2-0 after Helner scored a goal at 3:03, assisted by Kasper, and the Shamrocks went ahead 3-0 when Lauer scored 22 seconds later, with assists going to Heady and Jason Bellinger.

"We played a good team, a fast team — they came out flying," South coach Bob Bopp said. "This is no excuse but we've only

played once a week for the last two weeks (because of a postponement against Ann Arbor Huron) and we couldn't slow them down. This is the first game we've lost, so maybe we'll learn from it."

South's Mark Campbell cut the deficit to 3-1 with a goal at 3:46 of the first period, beating CC's goalie Jamie Ronayne, who played splendidly the rest of the way.

But CC's Brian Ronayne increased the lead back to three, 4-1, scoring on a power play at 11:42 after a scramble in front of the South net. The period ended with CC ahead 4-2 after South's David Tucker scored a power-play goal at 14:27 of the first period.

CC outshot South 44-40. Gumbelton wanted to give praise to defenseman Kasper and Brian Ronayne, who played most of the first period because another top defenseman, Mark Holdridge, was benched for missing a practice.

Heady, Novock and Helner also spent much of the night double shifting with the absence of Pete Davis (shoulder injury) and Jeff Lachapelle (who sat out because of fighting in a previous game).

"Everyone said they're the team to beat. We just outplayed them and beat them to the puck," Heady said. "The three goals right off the bat made the team feel good."

CC enjoyed a 5-2 lead at 8:23 of the second period after a goal by Heady, assisted by Mike Giordano and Kasper. The Blue Devils made the score 5-3 at 14:52 of the second period on a goal by Tom Rajt, but the beat they could manage in the third period offensively was a shot that hit the goal post.
