sympathy for the victim, a jury could be looking for some way to compensate that victim."

Although recent high-speed chases in the area — including ones through Sterling Heights and Warren — have grabbed headdines, the idea has been in the works for years.

"I introduced a pretty simple, straightforward version in 1983," said Van Regenmorter. "It made it a felony to fiee a marked police car. But it didn't pass. This is

much broader."

This bill, which Van Regonmorter plans to run past police, municipal and other groups, culd also include forfeiture of the auto by the person trying to eludo police, statewide standards for litting a high-speed chase, a way for victims to obtain compensation and heavier penalties for leading a high-speed chase

through residential areas or high concentration of pedestrians, he said.

Farmington Hills Police Chief
William Dwyer said the tougher
penalty is needed and could lower
the incidence of fleeing. But the
public shouldn't expect too much
from such a law.
"It's not going to be a panacea,"
Dwyer said. "We're still going to


