# Engler poses local tax cut/school cut dilemma

Suburban school districts, expecting to be stung by Gov. John
Engler's 20 percent proporty tax
cut plan, have two new big guns
in the House of Representatives.

"Rops. Lyn Bankes, R-Livonia,
and Jan Dolan, R-Farmington
Hills, will join Lansing's budget
writing inner circle: the House
Appropriations Committee. Both
are from out-of-formula districts,
considered too wealthy for state
did but facing stiff revenue losses
under Engler's tax cut plan.

"The State of the State messegs is just the governor's wishes,
not reality," said Bankes, a fifth
term member.

Ousted as chair of Approps was Upper Peninsula champion Dominic Jacobetti, D-Negaunce. "The money is not in the state-budget to reimburse local districtings," said Dolan. People have to realize a property tax cut is local money."

#### Engler: no problem

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Engler Thouday proposed cutting the tax base (assessments) by
20 percent over three years, but
with no state reimbureement for
lost revenue, "in formula" districts (which get state oid) could
have the lost revenue replaced by
the sid formula, but most Oakland and western Wayne districts
are out-of-formula and would be
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and and western wayne distributed are out-of-formula and would be out of luck.

Engler sees no problem. "I recognize that there are those who say schools cannot get better without more money, and that current inequities in funding make it impossible to improve outcomes. I disagree," he told the Legislature. Engler, starting his hird year as governor, said his budget message, due next month, will "reduce those inequities."

That is when Bankes, Dolan and Johnson will get to use their powers of bargaining and persuasion on Approps.

### Local legislators react

Sen. Jack Faxon, D-Farmington Hills, said Engler is "biting the hand that feeds him" by taking revenue away from suburban dis-



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tricts that are predominantly Republican. "It would cause us a 20 percent increase in (voted property) taxes (to replace lost revenue). He's making the (high tax) situation worse. He's doing himself enormous political damage." "We're gonna have problems with that, obviously," said second term Rep. John Jamian, R. Bloomfield Township, "We've gotta do it (cut taxes) without Birmingham and Bloomfield taking a big hit. Cutting taxes was

my big reason for coming up here."
"That was Phase I," said Sen. Mat Duneskies, R-Lake Orion, whose district includes Rochester. "Phase II is maybe one cent on the sales tax."
"A straight arm on the property tax would be devastating," said Sen. Michel Buuchard, R-Birmingham. "Other districts are up against the miliage cap," he said, referring to the state consitution's 50-mill limit on property

taxes. "That would be devastating, too."

Bouchard, meanwhile, is getting a plum assignment — a seat

Bouchard, meanwhile, is get-ting a plum assignment.—a seat on the taxwriting Finance Com-mitte. He moved into that open-ing when Nick Smith, It-Addison, was elected to Congress. "I'm very concerned this prop-erty tax relief will erode tax base from our schools," said Rep. Bar-bara Dobb, R-Union Lake, whose district includes West Bloom-field. "However, I have to get my

people property tax relief."

Dobb, though in hor second term, will move up the ladder to be vice chair of the House Taxation Committee.

#### First-year cuts

Rick Simonson, lobbyist for Oakland Intermediate School District, said local districts would lose \$71 million in revenue under the first year of Engler's plan.

If assessment were cut from 50

to 45 percent of market value, and if allowance were made for consumer price inflation, here, according to Simonson, are the losses for area districts:

Avondale \$1.3 million.

Birmingham \$5 million.

Bicomfield Hills \$3.9 million.
