
What's in a name? For more than four decades, the Farmington Bakery at 33520 Grand River. Through the year, the bakery was operated by Swedish harmingtants, by Swedish Americans, and, finally, other farmington, and his mother, Ljupka — who all are immigrants from the Macedonia region of the former Yugoslavia, Ljupka lives in Redford, but the bakery, in downtown Farmington, is a Mitrikeski family affair.
