In today's hand, we see Evelyn employing the constructive one dlamond overcall at its best. She has sufficient H.C.P. to make an informative double at the one level, but her hand isn't shaped to support any new suit that Jim introduces. Therefore, a one diamond overcall which says, partner, I have a good hand, but there's a flow in me doubling to get you to bld. Jim's move to game could be quibbled, but he knew partner had good cards and the ability to nlay them well. play them well.

After the club lead, the procedure needed to achieve a plus was a tonuous undertaking. There was a club, a heart and presumably two spade losers. (Note that with any other lead, which isn't likely, declarer has time to set the heart suit for a rufling innesses against. East in order to pitch the club loser.) Declarer won the lead in her hand and at trick (2), a diamond to dummy's king and a spade back to her king, pinpointing the trump nee. If East still held ace, lack or ace 10 of spades, there was no hope, so she was committed to the obligatory linesse, playing a low trump from each hand at trick (4), and the defense's expectation to set Evelyn was dashed as she hung up the spade ace. Her play gave the Whites a top heard, even though the odds weren't Oo percent, but that's what success is all about — picking your spots to star.
