Math, science MEAP scores ebb in high school

Everybody talks about how MEAP scores went up or down from one year to enother, but why do so many scores take a dive between the fourth-grade and 10th-grade tests? Are the kids getting

grade tests; Are the kins getting progressively stupider? Take the Michigan Education Assessment Program's science test, for example. Given in the fifth, eighth and 11th grades, the

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exam tests the students' general exam tests the students' general knowledge of science topics. Of Oakland County's 28 school districts, all but two reported a lower percentage of passing scores on the 11th-grade science test when compared to the fifth-grade

test.
One extreme example is Southfield, where about 81 percent of

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fifth-graders taking the test last September passed it, but just 33 percent of the 11th graders

passed.
Results of the MEAP math test are similar. Every school district in Oakland County shows a significant decline in the percentage of passing scores when comparing the 10th-grade test to the fourth-

grade test.

Even top-regarded school districts reflect this trend. In the Bloomfield Hills district about 68 price missing the process of the precent of fourth-graders passed the math test, but just 52 percent of 10th graders did. And that 52 percent is the highest in the county.

Not true of reading

This isn't as true of reading scores, most of which were up somewhat in the higher grades. Bob Greene, director of evaluation and research for Troy schools, said the dropoff in math and science is the result of four things:

and science is the result of lour things:

The 10th-grade science and math tests are more difficult for 10th graders than the fourth-grade tests are for fourth-graders.

Instruction for 10th graders is compartmentalized (science here, math there) as opposed to the homogeneous approach practiced in elementary school.

Teath worders have a lot more

in elementary school.

Tenth graders have a lot more going on in their lives than fourth graders do.

SAnd 10th graders don't necessarily take the courses needed to do well on the MEAP science and

do well on the MEAP science and math tests.
"Some kids mey not take any math at all in the ninth grade," Greene said. "We can do much more in a more focused way with fourth-grade students."

Jim Steeby, the assistant superintendent for instruction at Avondale schools, said that parents are more apt to get involved with their children's school work when they are in elementary school, but not so much later.

Parent involvement key

"There is a lot less parental willingness to work with the chil-

dren as they get older," he said, adding that open houses in obmentary schools are much better strended by parents than open houses in high schools.
Still, most school officials are looking for ways to increase 10th and 11th grade MEAP scores, and most often the answer is to teach subjects the tests emphasize and teach them before the tests are taken.

Bloomfield Hills students had the best math scores across the board. West Bloomfield seventh grade students were tops in reading, as were Birmingham 10th graders. Birmingham fifth graders scored highest in science, as did Troy eighth graders and West Bloomfield High School juniors.
