Salem overpowers North

Plymouth Salem clinched a tie for the Lakes Division wrestling championship Thursday by defeating North Farmington 49-18.

The Rocks finish 4-1 in their half of the Western Lakes Activities Association with the same record at Westland John Glenn and Livonia Stevenson.

North fell behind 18-0 after losing the first three bouts on pins. The Raiders won four of the next five, but all four victories were minor decisions. North cut into the Salem lead (24-12) but failed to catch up.

North's Dave Orey (125) defeated Mark Buley 7-2, Mark McDonald (130) edged Phil Mitchell 8-5, Mark Hoffmann (135) defeated Dave Craig 11-8 and Andy Gertz (145) defeated Aaron Lapinski 10-7.

The only other North victory

came from Jared Lawrence (160), who pinned Jeff Harrison in 8:43.

Farmington stayed close for half the meet with Livonia Stevenson but eventually lost 49-18.

The Falcons were behind only 16-13 after winning the 135 contest, but Stevenson won five bouts and had two walkovers in the last seven victories.

Farmington's Matt Michalski (103) defeated Dan Christensen 8-3, John Lane (119) defeated Chris Kwait 11-3 and Mike Prough (135) pinned Jeff Kosola (3-00).

The Falcons finish 0-5 in the Lakes Division and are 1-8 overall.

Farmington Hills Harrison had two winners Thursday during a 53-8 loss to Northville.

Derek Jaeger (125) defeated Chris Harrison 6-4 in overtime, and heavyweight Mark Gietzner pinned Adam Davis in 1:46.

Shamrocks put Rice on ice with 3-0 win

If Birmingham Brother Rice forward Dale Rominski went home Friday night with a migraine, he can blame a guy named Ronayne.

Redford Catholic Central beat Rice 3-0 as goalie Jamie Rominski stopped all 38 of the shots he faced, including a pair of easy scoring opportunities by Rominski, before a big crowd at Oak Park Community Ice Arena.

With CC leading 2-0 in the third period, Ronayne made an incredible glove save against Rominski while lying on his back in the Shamrocks' goal crease. Rominski had Ronayne down and a wide open net but lifted the puck right into Ronayne's mitt.

Ronayne also stopped Rominski on a breakaway in the second period but the save everyone was talking about was the one in the third.

"The puck came from the point, I thought he (Rominski) was going to tip it, so I went into the butterfly position (on the ground)," Ronayne said. "He stopped the puck, brought it around, I dived over and good things happen. . . I couldn't catch it. I had to make it look routine, at least try to."

CC defenseman Brian Ronayne, Jamie's cousin, said the save left Rice's players shaking their heads.

"That was the most incredible thing I've ever seen," Brian Ronayne said. "Rice forward Mike Jelaha skated up to me and said this is outrageous."

The victory improved CC to 4-2 in the Michigan Metro Hockey League, 10-2-3 overall. Rice fell to 5-4 in the Metro, 9-6 overall.

Rice outshot CC, 38-13, including 15-5 in the first period.

CC scored the only goal of the first period as Jason Bellinger

beat Rice goalie Kris Arthur at 3:59 after a scramble in front of the net.

Rice coach Mike Brown thought the Warriors scored in the second period when one of the Warriors hit the post and the puck appeared to have trickled behind the goal line. But the referees did not count the goal.

It was typical of the way the night went.

"We had our chances but when you don't put the puck in the back of the net, that's the way it goes," Brown said. "We ran into a hot goalie. He's the only reason they were still in the game. You have to get it to happen again. CC. We've got them there (at Redford Ice Arena) in two weeks, and we'll be there."

CC scored power play goals in the second and third periods to add to their lead.

With Rice's Steve Jones in the penalty box for roughing, CC's Jan Heady took the puck out of the corner and fired the puck on a 45-degree angle past Arthur for a 2-0 lead at 8:40 of the second period.

The Shamrocks added an insurance goal at 11:03 of the third period when Justin Ronayne scored while Rominski was serving a two-minute minor for high sticking.

Ken Luter and Heady had one assist each Friday and Frank Novack collected a pair of assists. A player identified as "No. 5" at the scorer's table also collected an assist but there was no "No. 5" on CC's roster.

CC coach Jack Gumbleton, wearing an ice pack on his forehead after accidentally getting hit by a stick while on the bench, was pleased with his players' effort.

"That was super," Gumbleton said of the goaltending. "It was a team effort. We played well when we had to."
