Knollenberg, Carr vote against family leave bill

Eccentric-area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending Feb. 5

Yes to approve family leave: By a vote of 247 for and 152 against, the House sent to President Clinton a bill (HR 1) requiring employers of at least 50 workers to proof at least 50 workers to pro-vide unpaid annual leave of up to 12 weeks for childbirth or other medical circum-stances involving an employ-ee or close family member. Those on leave would continue to receive benefits and be assured of returning to the same job or a comparable och. .A yes vote was to pass the lill. Area representatives voting yes were: Dale Kil-dee, D-Filnt, Sander Levin, D-Southfield and William Ford, D-Ypalienti. Voting no were: Bob Carr, D-Pontiac and Joseph Knollenberg, R-

No to apply family leave to Congress: By a vate of 175 for and 253 against, the House refused to fully apply the family leave measure (above) to members of Congress.

No to exempt key employees: The House rejected, 185 for and 238 against, a GOP-drafted amendment giving employers more flexibility under the family and medical leave measure (above). The amendment allowed employers to dory leave to workers at any pay lovel whose absence would cause substantial economic harm to the company or pose a safety sisk to coworkers. It went beyond language in the bill exempting only a company's highest-paid workers.

Opponent William Ford, D. Mich., sald the amendment would "totally destroy the availability of the basic right of the bill," which is to help workers cope with emergencies at home.

Yes to ease voter registration: By a vote or 259 for and 160 against, the House sent the Senate a "motor voter" bill (HR 2) requiring states to make voter registration a voluntary part of applying for a driver's license and certain other public certificates, and to allow registration by mail.

amendment defent-ed: By a vote of 62 for and 37 against, the Senate tabled (killed) an amendment giving force of law to the mill-tary services' policy of ex-cluding homosexuals be-ceived in the fervise of digital. cause of their sexual orienta-tion. The GOP-drafted

amendment was in response to President Clinton's efforts to phase-out the policy. A yes vote opposed writing into law the Pentagon ban on

law the Pentagon ban on osexuals. Carl Levin and Don Riegie voted yes.

Yes on family and medical leave: The Sen-ate passed, 71 for and 27 against, a bill (S 1) mandat.

So workers provide employ-ees with up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave annually to deal with childbirth and other medical conditions involving themselves or a close family member.

A yes vote was to pass the bill, Michigan Sens. Carl Levin and Donald Riegle both voted yes.
