Cops beef up community relations

Farmington's Public Safety Department officials want to continue to improve community relations programs.
That's only one goal for the upcoming year, according to acting public safety director Clary Goss.
But it's one residente keep their eyes on.

But it's one residents keep their eyes on.

Neighborhood Watch is one such program. Some 2,260 Farmington residents on 110 blocks — roughly 80 percent — participate.

They meet with public safety officers the second Thursday of each month to get tips on keeping heir homes secure and to hear news on any burglaries.

"It's a good program; it's an active program," Goss said. "We'd like to see even more involvement."

Since the program's inception

like to see even more involvement."

Since the program's inception in October 1983, there's been a sharp decrease in burglaries.

Farmington averaged 110 burglaries aver prior to 1983. Last year, there were 14. In 1993, there were 8 reported and 11 in 1990.

"Nelghborhood Watch is not totally responsible," said commander Charles Lee, who coordinates the program. "(But) What else has caused such a dramatic decrease in burglaries?"

Goss would like to see that success rub off on other community outreach programs such as Business Watch and school programs such as Taching, Helping, Involving, Noticing Kids (THINK) and the liaison program at Farmington High.

Business Watch has 70 businesses involved, primarily in the Downtown Development Authority area and the Uptown Plaza Goss would like to see that expanded.


The group only meets annually. Businesses are alerted regularly, though, to crime trends that range from a rash of armed robberies to someone who's writing bad checks in the area.

Another officer has been added to THINK, which is a drug and alcohol awareness program for elementary and middle school children. Officers Terry Purves and Maria Putt coordinate the program, visiting schools regularly to speak on substance abuse education.

Other Farmington Public Safety goals:

B Adopt the National Fire Academy's incident command system. The system establishes a chain of command when different departments are involved in fighting a fire.

E Continue to look into alternatives to the use of lethal force such as freeze or pepper fog, which can incapacitate an armed suspect for up to 20 minutes.
