Sheriff asks board to wait for facts Commissioners remained silent as Nichols finished and brusquely walked to his seat. He tersely answered a few questions from reporters then left the building. Commissioner Donn Wolf, Rermington Hills, said he was satisfied with Nichols' address." I think I speak for most of my collegues when I say I have faith in the sheriff and I'm willing to withhold judgment." Commissioner Lawrence R. Pernick, D. Southfield, however, reiterated his earlier request that outside agencies — such as the Michigan Stato Police which handled the Maiers case — investigate all allegations of impropriety. That's the only way to assure full disclosure, insisted Pernick — a contention that many colleagues, especially Republicans, strongly reject.

It wasn't an apology. And he didn't whine.

But Oakland Sheriff John F.

Nichols was obviously angry when he addressed county com-missioners Thursday in his first public acknowledgement of the problems besetting his 800-per-

problems besetting his 800-person department.

"I do not come to ask for sympathy," Nichols told commissioners during the public comment assision of their regular meeting, "nor to give excuses. But to point out some facts you should keep in mind as you deal with the vast amounts of publicity given these events."

amounts of publicity given tases events."
Criminal warrants and internal disciplinary action will likely result, Nichols said. And the investigations will take longer than two or three more weeks.
"These events," of course, are three separate scandials that have surfaced within the last six weeks.

in a department previously thought to be running like a Swiss watch. Those scandals have prompted even the most staunch supporter to privately question Nichols' management style.

The most recent — and clear.

with a civilian employee, Terry A. Maiers, appearing in court for all legedly taking an undisclosed amount of manny possibly as amount of money — possibly as much as \$80,000 — from a secure

much as \$50,000 — from a secure property room.

The other scandals — with more implications — involve the work release program and alleged misuse of money or resources in the sheriff's substation which services Rochester Hills.

Sheriff's investigators are proling the work release program, where inmates apparently did work or performed favors illegally for deputies and/or their supervisors.

But the prosecutor's office along with sheriff's investigators are looking into problems at the Rochester Hills substation.

"We're approaching this with a task force," Prosecutor Richard Thompson said Friday. The pro-secutor declined to elaborate.

secutor declined to elaborate.
Nichols was almost as tightlipped in his brief address to commissioners. Problems in the work
release program and at the Rocheater Hills substation were detected internally, he said. "These
issues were not thrust upon us by

that we discovered ourselves and brought to light ourselves, and we dealt with openly and candidly."

The lack of charges — or inter-nal disciplinary action — so far does not indicate a reluctance to deal with the issues, Nichols said, but were a result of the magnitude of the investigations "coupled with a number of allegations pub-lished in the paper."

lished in the paper."
The prosecutor has handled the investigations promptly and appropriately, Nichola said. "He must prove and verify (allegations) before he may take them into a court of law. This is not a roluctance... to deal with issued but merely a dealer to be thorough, fair and homest to all parties concerned."

ties concerned."

Nichols urged commissioners
— and presumably residents — to
avoid jumping to conclusions and
to withhold judgment until the
investigations are completed and
the relevant facts made public.

"I sak that you stop and take
all factors into consideration before you involve yourselves in remarks that are unfair and deleterious to the overall moral of the
department," Nichols said.


"He (Riegie) was asleep at


