

Oakland CC men lose in overtime

The Oakland Community College men's basketball team failed to gain a share of the Eastern Conference lead Saturday, losing 125-122 in overtime to host Flint Mott.

The loss dropped OCC to 13-11 overall, 9-5 in the Eastern Conference. First-place Mott is 15-9 overall, 11-3 in the Eastern Conference.

OCC rallied to tie the game at the end of regulation, 107-107, despite playing most of the way without starter Bill Thurston and trailing 52-39 at halftime. Thurston injured his ankle early in the game and the Raiders also lost Ray Moreland, Bill Knight and Bill Sete late in the game due to foul trouble.

Lonnie Pertert scored a game-high 46 points, including seven three-pointers in the first half, to lead Mott.

"He's a great player — and we were all over him, too," OCC coach Lynn Reed said.

OCC trailed by 12 with 2:38 remaining in regulation before freshman guard Craig Martin got hot. Martin, who scored a team-high 32 points, made two shots from three-point range in the last 2 1/2 minutes. Martin's second triple, with 32 seconds left, tied the score at 107.

After a Mott turnover, OCC got the ball for a final shot but Martin's three-pointer at the buzzer went in and out.

"That's the shot we wanted," Reed said. "He's such a great shooter and has made two or three to win games before."

Mott jumped out to an early lead in OT and sealed the outcome with 10 of 11 free throws in the extra five minutes.

OCC made 43-of-60 shots from the floor, including 9-19 three-pointers. Mott made 40-70 field goal attempts.

Troy Coleman scored 31 for OCC. Kevin Woodzorek added 23 and Willio Payne scored 16.

The Raiders suffered an 87-83 loss Wednesday at Delta College, despite 26 points by Thurston.

Delta's Wes Wood sank a three-point shot with 10 seconds left to erase an 83-82 deficit and go ahead 85-84. After an OCC turnover, Delta was fouled and made two free throws to make the lead 87-83. OCC's three-pointer at the buzzer was no good.

Thurston, playing on a healthier ankle, made 8-of-10 three-pointers to lead OCC. Coleman scored 17 points, Moreland had 13 and Martin 12.

OCC shot 29-57 from the field, including 15-18 at the free throw line. The Raiders led 43-40 at halftime.

"Both games we very easily could have won," Reed said. "We played hard, intelligently. Hopefully we can learn from them (the losses)."

Cahill led the balanced Hawks' attack with 11 points. Senior Keye Smith dished out 10 assists, and junior center Calvin Pruitt added nine points. Williams, playing in his fifth game on the varsity, chipped in eight points and seven rebounds.

Senior guard Matt April, who tallied a game-high 14 points, scored seven of the Falcons' first nine points in the third quarter and helped close the margin to 33-26, but once again Harrison pulled away behind a 3-0 spurt to end the quarter.

Teachman and Cahill disagreed somewhat on the intensity level played by the Hawks.

"We may have had too much emotion, and you can tell by the way we shot our free throws," Teachman said.

"Our vacation (winter break) has a lot to do with how we played," Cahill said. "We played pretty lackadaisical. Hopefully, we'll be able to come back."

The victory gave Harrison the Farmington city championship as the Hawks beat North Farmington earlier in the season, 65-38.

Teachman added Harrison has also beaten the three Livonia schools and has a chance to sweep the Plymouth-Canton schools when the Hawks play at Canton.

North frustrated by 1-point defeat

Walled Lake Western's Jon Woodward scored the game-winning basket with four seconds left Tuesday as the host Warriors nipped North Farmington 46-45.

The Raiders had opportunities to win it before and after.

North made just three of seven free-throw attempts. One of the misses was a front end of a one-and-one opportunity that came with 10 seconds left and North ahead 45-44.

After Woodward's basket, Chris Ward narrowly missed a desperation three-pointer at the buzzer.

John Pennala scored 24 points to lead North, 4-6 in the Western Lakes Activities Association and 7-9 overall. Woodward scored 16 to lead Western, also 4-6 and 7-9.

BENEDICTINE 73, RICE 53: The Warriors took a 51-48 lead into the final period Tuesday, but host Benedictine stole the game with a 25-2 fourth quarter.

"Benedictine changed their defense," said Rice coach Frank Carri-co. "They'd played man-to-man the whole game. But they went to a half-court trap in the fourth quarter. We didn't handle it well. We had seven turnovers in the fourth quarter. We didn't make the shots that presented themselves against their press. And the turnovers led to fast-break baskets. And when you only score one basket in the fourth quarter, that's pretty sad. And that came late in the quarter."

Benedictine, 16-1, had a 14-9 lead after one quarter but Rice took a 34-31 edge into halftime. D.J. MacAloon had 28 points in-

cluding 13 in the third quarter. Willis Marshall added 11.

Rice, 6-10, plays host to Orchard Lake St. Mary's on Feb. 26.

LUTHERAN NW 86, C'VILLE 82: Mark Kaljovic's 23 points were not enough Tuesday, as Livonia Clarenceville (0-6, 6-4) lost a Metro Conference encounter at Rochester Hills Lutheran Northwest (10-5, 7-3).

Jeremy Harrison paced the victorious Crusaders with 24 points. Teammate Steve Lemke contributed 11.

N'VILLE 72, GLENN 65: On Tuesday, the host Mustangs outscored Westland John Glenn 24-10 in the second period en route to the WLAA victory.

John Ferrar and Mike Maschek tallied 18 and 14, respectively, for Northville, now 10-6 overall and 5-6 in the conference.

John Miller, a senior forward, scored 20 to lead the Rockets (11-4, 7-3), who lost for the third straight time. Seniors Ken Taylor and Aaron Scheffer chipped in with 17 and 11, respectively.
