Elementary teacher charged with sexual assault

A Westland man faces up to life in prison if convicted of sexually assaulting an 11-year-old Farmington Hills boy. Gerald Joseph Bauer Jr., 31, was arraigned Feb. 12 on one count of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and two counts of second-degree CSC. He

pleaded not guilty to the charges. Bauer is a teacher at St. Paul's Elementary School in Northville.

The incident allegedly took place on Jan. 15 in Farmington Hills when Bauer was visiting relatives. He was released on a

\$10,000 bond and faces a pre-liminary exam Monday in 47th District Court.

St. Paul's officials said Bauer, who has taught sixth grade at the school for the past two years, has been given a leave of absence.
