

Elementary teacher charged with sexual assault

A Westland man faces up to life in prison if convicted of sexually assaulting an 11-year-old Farmington Hills boy.

General Joseph Bauer Jr., 31, was arraigned Feb. 12 on one count of first-degree criminal sexual conduct and two counts of second-degree CSC. He

pleaded not guilty to the charges. Bauer is a teacher at St. Paul's Elementary School in Northville.

The incident allegedly took place on Jan. 15 in Farmington Hills when Bauer was visiting relatives. He was released on a

\$10,000 bond and faces a preliminary exam Monday in 47th District Court.

St. Paul's officials said Bauer, who has taught sixth grade at the school for the past two years, has been given a leave of absence.

Former resident guilty of bank fraud charge

A former Farmington Hills resident pleaded guilty in federal court to bank fraud and the use of false information to obtain a Social Security number.

U.S. attorney Stephen J. Markman said that Grace Ann Davey, 53, admitted forging signatures on Ultracom Telecommunications Inc. checks between 1989 and 1991 and obtaining more than \$800,000.

Davey, who is Canadian, was extradited from Winnipeg, Manitoba, on Sept. 8, 1992, to stand

trial. Judge George E. Woods accepted Davey's plea.

She faces a maximum penalty of 30 years in prison or a fine of more than \$2 million or both on the bank fraud charge and lesser penalties on the other charges.

Davey remains in jail pending her sentence, for which a date has not been set.

The FBI and Canadian law enforcement agencies in Ontario, Saskatchewan and Manitoba investigated the case.

POLICE/FIRE CALLS

Listed below are some of the Farmington area police incidents, fire calls and court cases reported during the past week.

THEFTS
A \$200 snowblower was stolen from a garage on Meadow Hill in Farmington Hills Feb. 1 or 2.

A man's diamond ring, valued at \$1,550, was stolen from a residence on Seven Oak Court in Farmington Hills between Dec. 19, 1992 and Jan. 8, 1993.

Dental bridgework worth \$700 was stolen from a jacket at the YMCA on Farmington Road in Farmington Hills on Feb. 15.

Three men's suits valued at \$750 were stolen from the Men's Wearhouse on Orchard Lake in Farmington Hills on Feb. 13.

FALSE PRETENSES
Farmington Hills Police are investigating alleged forgeries of signatures on checks at Temporary Restrooms on Orchard Lake between Dec. 20, 1992 and Feb. 12, 1993. Checks valued at \$1,482.89 were forged during that time.

RETAIL FRAUD
A 22-year-old man is facing retail fraud and concealed weapons charges after two incidents Feb. 12 at Danny's Market in Livonia and Farmer Jack in Farmington. Livonia police received a call from a witness who said he'd seen a man coming out of Danny's with something hidden under his coat. The witness saw the person drive northbound on Farmington Road, turning into Crossroads shopping center. Farmington public safety officers approached the individual in his parked vehicle after he left Farmer Jack. Officers found a 4-inch hunting knife and a folding

knife on the man. In the vehicle, four boneless sirloin steaks (valued at \$19) were recovered as well as cooked shrimp (\$29) and lobster (\$39). The man was released on bail after entering a not-guilty plea in front of Judge Fred Harris at 47th District Court.

ASSAULT AND BATTERY
A student told public safety officers he was assaulted by another student Feb. 11 at Farmington High. The victim said he was struck twice in the face and received abrasions and some swelling near his right cheek. He did not request medical treatment. The victim told police the fight started over him wearing the other student's hat earlier in the day.

DOMESTIC ASSAULT
A 63-year-old Farmington man faces assault and battery charges after striking his ex-wife Feb. 13. She was hit several times, suffering a cut and swollen right eye and a cut lip. The victim said the problem had been ongoing, but she never contacted the police before. She said the man has a mental condition, but is not under a doctor's care. The two were married in 1983, but divorced a year later. The two have lived together off-and-on since. The man told Farmington public safety officers that the fight started because of her "shrilly" voice. Bond was set at \$2,000 and the stipulation the subject cannot go within 1,000 yards of the residence where the incident occurred.

AUTO THEFT
A 1991 maroon Chevy Blazer valued at \$17,000 was stolen from a residence on Hallwood Court in Farmington Hills on Feb. 12.

RECOVERED PROPERTY
A white 1986 Pontiac 6000 valued at \$4,000 was recovered at the Mountain Jack's restaurant on Sinacola in Farmington Hills on Feb. 14. The keys had been left in

the ignition. The car had been stolen on Feb. 5 in Wixom.

A VCR stolen from a residence on Hunters Drive in Farmington Hills was recovered at an apartment on 12 Mile.


EMBEZZLEMENT
An employee at Marshalls on Orchard Lake in Farmington Hills is accused of embezzling \$1,261.69 in cash from the store from Feb. 11-13. A customer paid for \$103.99 in merchandise, but found that the receipt had been voided by the 25-year-old Detroit woman who was working at the cash register. The customer took the receipt to the manager, who called police.

ARMED ROBBERY
A man, age 35-40, with blond hair and a mustache, gold-rimmed glasses and a stone-washed blue denim jacket, robbed a 7-11 store on Middlebelt in Farmington Hills on Feb. 13 of \$140 in cash.


VANDALISM
The passenger window and door of a gray 1986 Ford parked on Valley in Farmington Hills sustained \$800 in damage between Feb. 14-15.

MARIJUANA POSSESSION
A driver was ticketed Feb. 11 for possessing 2.1 grams of marijuana after he was pulled over by Farmington public safety officers for disobeying a stop light at Power and Grand River. The man consented to a search in which officers found a plastic bag containing the drug. They also found two "roaches" in the car.
