The connection is in-direct — inspired by Tolston's dramatic story under that title. Having been written in the early part of this century, it features some contemporary sound effects. This performance conveyed the

searing, emotional and dramatic effects of this work with a force that could not be ignored even by those who have never heard this work before.

Among the chamber works by Brahms — his string quartets are probably the most neglected. But the Quartet in A minor, op. 51 No. 2 presented on this occasion, reverberated with atrength and con-
