Show examines unusual medicine

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According to a New England Journal of Medicine report, one in three Americans uses alternative medicine.

'That intrigues Dr. Philip Singer, who has done his own investigation of the subject.

'The medical anthropologist and Oakland University professor his put together an ongoing series, "Complementary Health Therapies," which is being shown on MetroVision.

The series covers a wide variety of alternative medicines, including spiritual healing, accupancture and homeopathy. Singer filmed the project at National Service Hospitals in England, where some of these unorthody methods are practiced.

'Singer, a Southfield resident, interviews doctors, therapists and patients. The documentary is nelther pro nor con.

"My view as an medical anthropologist is describing, as accurately as possible, things as they are," said Singer, who teaches in OU's School of Health Science.

"So I'm not coming out on one side or the other. I'm just describing what is taking place."

"Complomentary Health
Therapies" is a timely topic.

Americans made 425 million visits to unconventional medical practitioners, according to the New England Journal study. That compares to 388 million trips made to primary care physicians.

Many of the people using such methods fall into the 25-49 age

range, Singer said.

native medicine.

unlike his work, though, Singer said the program hosted by Bill Moyers takes a positive view of alternative medicine. Also, Singer notes that he paid \$10,000 out of

"From watching the PBS series they will draw the conclusion: Indeed, if you're not astisfied with your primary care physician—and many people are not — you can go to one of these unconventional doctors, 'Singer said.

U.S. such methods take "MTV
look" of televangelizm.
The programs vary in length
from 20 minutes to nearly an hour
and half. Six are celited. More are
on the way.

"People are very concerned
with health issues in general,"
Whitman said. "Some people feel,
I don't care if I got to stand in a
bucket of guacamole; if it cures
cancer then thank you."

He offered the program to
Channel 2, but they wanted to
cdit it into a two-minute segment.
Singer pitched the idea to Lark
Samouelian of MetroVision.

"Really, community access is the technological town hall of the 21st century," he said.







Earned Income Credit. You may be entitled to a credit of up to \$2,211 if your adjusted gross income is less than \$22,370 and you have a qualifying child.

Selling Your Home. You may be able to postpone the tax on part or all of your gain, or maybe even get greater breaks if you're 55 or older.

Casualty Losses. Losses suffered from events such as fires, tornadoes, hurricanes, floods and car accidents

may be deductible.

Elderly or Disabled. You may be able to claim this credit if you're 65 or older, or if you are retired on disability and were permanently and totally disabled when you retired.

Electronic Filing. This won't save you money, but will get you a refund faster, usually about three weeks after we receive the return,
