A third Detroit artist, Robert Hopkin (1832-1909), came to the area via Glasgow, Scotland. As self-taught artisk, he was apprendiced at 14 to a carriage painter but went on to create ornamental interior decorations for such old landmarks as St. Anne's Cathedral and the Detroit Opera House. His painting of a destroyer, available in the sale, was originally an illustration for the book, "America The Beautiful." Some paintings literally give

the viewer a whole other side to ponder. Aeron Harry Gorson (1872-1983) painted two portraits of the same woman. The principal portrait shows the subject wear-ing a green 1st. On the reverse side is a picture of the same wom-an without a hat.

The portrait is also unusual in that Gorson was known for industrial scenes such as steel mills glowing in the night.

## Take care to prevent photo problems



Have you ever picked up a roll of film from the lab where the pictures on the film don't look anything like those you remember taking? Certain things can go haywire that can spoil those special shots.

To avoid disappointment, some care and a methodical approach is all that you'll need to avert problems on the film. Listed below are some common problems with advice on bow they can be avoided.

Fogging is what happens to the film if the back of the camera is accidentally opened. Usually three or four frames will be lost. Make sure the back is shut tightly, advance the film a couple of frames and retake the last shots.

A black band covers about a third of the negative when too fast a chutter speed is used with flash. Most camera is synthonize at 1/60

n shutter speed is used with Hash. Most cameras synchronize at 1/60 second so be sure to use this shutter speed.

Negative thinking: No problems with the negative here. Everything worked just right for Monte Nagler's camera in this picture of the Japanese Garden at Cranbrook.

Flare, a hard shining light or the film, occurs when you point the camera too close to the sun or when a lean shade isn't used. Careful precautions will eliminate this problem.

Vignetting is the darkening of caused by the wrong lens hood or caused by the wrong lens hood or here again, with simple precautions, vignetting should never be a problem.

Raindrops on your lens act like samal lenses themselves and can distort the picture. If there's any precipitation in the air, use a lens dod to ry ou many pick up the image of the hair on the negative. Keep a small can on feompressed air in your camera hag to avoid any hairy experiences.
