Egg-hatching project links subjects

Chickens and Japanese quail soon will hatch at Botsford Elementary, thanks to a \$383 grant to the Clarenceville Adjustment Program from the Oakland County Chapter of Phi Delta Kappa.

The program, housed at Botsford, helps severely emotionally impaired youngsters ages 6-11 who live in Oakland County.

The three teachers in the program, Chuck Day, Barbara Anderson and social worker Nancy Martin, all believed exposure to wildlife would help their students have more empathy with and understanding for nature's creatures.

But they didn't have the money to start such a

program. So they applied for a grant from Phi Delta Kappa, and received the check at Thursday's meeting of the Clarenceville Board of Education.

"We were extremely lucky to receive a grant," Anderson said.

The money will be used to buy everything needed to launch the hatching program. The students also will help build an incubator.

The eggs to be hatched will come from the 4-H Club, and the chickens and quail, when grown, will be returned to 4-H members.

"The students will be able to see them hatch and then grow," Anderson said.

In the coming weeks, most of the curriculum for students in CAP will center on the hatching program.

about half of the missing jewelry was discovered at the store, and the rest is believed to have been sold.

"The jewelry in question was made in Santa Fe, N.M., by Kabana Jewelry and has distinctive markings, making it easy to identify," Krause said.

Contacted by the Observer Friday, Moloney said the entire incident is a mistake.

"There is no problem," Moloney said. "It will all come out on the 22nd (the date of the preliminary examination)."

Detective Sgt. Chuck Nebus of the Farmington Hills Police said that if there were no problem, Moloney had not explained that to police.

"If these guys have a different version, they didn't tell us," Nebus said.

SCHEDULING ARTHRITIC DRUGS

You take certain arthritis medications 3x/day, others at 2x/day, and a few at 1x/day. In the case of methotrexate, you schedule a week's worth in one day!

Most arthritis drugs enter the body quickly and leave in hours, via the urine. The medicines work by maintaining a level-like water in a car battery and need frequent recharging. The best example is aspirin. Even the long acting form in a regular manner, the medicine can soon build up to dangerous levels. Therefore some physicians prefer a 2x/day medication as the best compromise between convenience and safety.

Methotrexate, taken one time a week, is a special case. It works by preventing the body with a sudden large concentration. This approach stops reproduction of T lymphocytes, cells important in perpetuating the inflammation of rheumatoid arthritis.

Check before changing the timing of your medication. Likely your doctor can explain the reasons why you should comply with the original instructions.
