Silhouettist to cast welcome shadows at visit

In silhouette art, the artist has the subjects sit in a chair and shines a light on them, casting a shadow on a screen. He then uses the shadow as a reference for creating a black paper cutout of his subject's profile.

Rice is called a performance silhouettist because of the crowd appeal of his quickly snipping scissors. A sheet of pa-per is transformed to a work of art in less than five minutes.

"It is fascinating to watch his hands. He is very fast," said Baby and Me co-owner Loretta Globerson.

"Silhouettes appeal to people who may remember having them done in the past at school and find delight in their traditional simplicity of design. We like to offer this as an extra service to our customers."

Portraits are \$14 each, which includes two copies, with framing and matte an additional \$10 per copy. Call 855-3214 to schedule a seating appointment. The traditional appeal of silhouette portraits makes them a popular Mother's Day gift, both for mothers and grandmothers, Globerson said. She has also noticed a similar trend of returning to traditional styles in clothing and other appointments for infants and children, and in maternity wear.

But portraits aren't limited only to children, she said. Many adults and adolescents have

their profiles preserved in this traditional style.

Rice comes from a family of professional silhouttitate, learning the art from his grandfather Carrw Rice. He is one of only 30 silhouttitate left in the country and is unusual in that he also creates landscapes and other scenes. Besed in South Carolina, Rice regularly tours throughout the country. His only Detroit area stop will be at Baby and Me.
