BEFORE DEPARTING, a few comments will be made in answer to a couple letters from faithful readers objecting to an interview news story with A. Alfred Taubman, proponent for the regional shopping center in Farmington Township, published by this newspaper.

During public hearings, front page news stories carried lengthy accounts of objections being raised by homeowners. Those same stories also included arguments from the proponents.

Time had passed, and the proponent was preparing to appeal to the township board. An interview was arranged to discuss why the board should approve the rezoning for the center.

The story included numerous attributions which made it clear the views expressed were those of

the center locating here that he cannot accept publication of the proponent's views without immediately lashing back needs to seek balance in his own thinking.

Another problem is that there cannot be found one homeowner who fairly represents the views of 50,000 residents while it is fair to assume Taubman is a reliable source to tap for views of the Taubman Co. since he is the chairman of the board.

speak at future public hearings on this issue will be quoted in this paper. But truth cannot be served by interviewing a single homeowner or by republishing views previously expressed in print.

Today's column is simply an explanation, and any reader who chooses may continue to freely express indignation over this opinionated column and the one-sided views given in a news story reporting an interview with one man.

TAX ANTICIPATION NOTES

Sealed bids for the purchase of tax anticipation notes of Farmington Public School District, County of Oakland, Michigan, of the par value of \$1,200,000.00 will be received by the undersigned at 12500 Shawwassee Street, Farmington, Michigan, until 8:00 a.m., Eastern Standard Time, on the 15th day of July, 1971, at which time and place they will be publicly opened and read.

The notes will be dated July 9, 1971, and will mature March 15, 1972 and will bear interest at a rate or rates not exceeding 6 1/2% per annum. Both principal and interest will be payable at a bank or trust company located in the State of Michigan to be designated by the original purchaser of the notes which paying agent qualifies as such under the Statutes of the State of Michigan or of the Federal Government, subject to the approval of the Farmington Public School District. Denominations and form of notes to be at the option of the purchaser. Accrued interest to date of delivery of such notes must be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

The notes shall be subject to redemption in direct numerical order at par and accrued interest on the first day of any month prior to maturity upon 30 days' notice served by registered mail upon the known holder or holders thereof, or published in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan which carries as a part of its regular service notices of the sale of municipal bonds and notes.

For the purpose of awarding the notes the interest cost of each bid will be computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified therein, the total dollar value of all interest on the notes from July 9, 1971 to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium. The notes will be awarded to the bidder whose bid on the above computation produces the lowest dollar interest cost to the municipality. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the notes or at a price less than their par value will be considered.

The loan is in anticipation of the operating portion of the School Tax for the fiscal year commencing July 1, 1971, which tax is due and payable December 1, 1971.

A certified cashier's check in the amount of 2 1/2% of the par value of the notes, drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer must accompany each bid as a guarantee of good faith on the part of the bidder to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid be accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the notes. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be promptly returned.

Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified opinion of the purchaser's attorney approving the legality of the notes, to be secured at the purchaser's expense. The purchaser shall furnish notes ready for execution at his expense. Notes will be delivered at a place to be agreed upon with the purchaser. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids. Envelopes containing the bids should be plainly marked, "Proposal for Notes."
