Community leaders and residents alike gathered to explore the context of cultural and ethnic.

The workshop was the second in a two-part series.

"I don't like to call it a melting pot," said Margot Linebarger, an African American resident of Farmington Hills. "I prefer to call it a atir fay. A stir fry still maintains its distinctive flavor."

Linebarger summed up the views expressed by Richard Lobenthal, who was the guest speaker.

Lobenthal is a member of the Anti-Defamation League and a consultant for Intergroup Relationships. He spoke to the need to acknowledge differences in culture and race and not ignore them.

To do otherwise creates more problems, he said.
"If you really want to treat everyone equal, that's good," Lobenthal said. "We also want to be color blind and that's bad, because we then refuse to acknowledge the differences we have."

There's a proper and an improper way to do that, according to Loebenthal. To illustrate his point, he made the statement: "You people. .. "What's wrong with that? he asked.
Audience members responded, asying the term is offensive. As a result, Lobenthal was put on the defensive.

"You can call me stupid; that will make me defensive," he said.

"You can call me racist and that will end it (the conversation). "How do you educate me?" he

"How do you educate me?" he asked.

Lobenthal said people of divergent cultures have to go beyond accuser and defendant roles. They must be able to negotiate their cultural differences. "If you're not willing to negotiate cultural differences, you're saying, "I's my culture, do it my way," Lobenthal said. "What you're saying is, "You're not welcomed here."

Lobenthal added racism must be confronted by all people and "not leaving it up to the victim to defend themselves against discrimination."

though. People of different races
and backgrounds sat together and
discussed issues openly.

"There's a real barrier because people are afraid they're going to use politically incorrect language," said the Rev. Mark Sommers, who is a pastor at North Parmington Community Church.

Another woman expressed exasperation with what she sees as bleatent raciens. She said her family received a warm welcome from another resident in her Farmington Hills neighborhood when they moved in.

"I thought, "This is wonderful," said the woman, who is an African American. "She was the last person who extended herself to us in the community."
