Some Farmington Harrison students obviously know a thing or two about teamwork. For the third consecutive year, the school won in its diversion in the State TEAMS Competition March 20 at GMI in Flint.
Harrison had the highest score, 75 percent. Detroit Country Day and Heritage schools had 72 percent. West Bloomfield notched 66 percent while Kalamazoo Math & Science had 61 percent.

Harrison's team includes Michael LaCosse, Kristi Bosk-er, Andrew Garinger, Jeremy Teachman, Avi Driesman, Er-gun Kocak, Morris Slutsky and Brett Pearce.

The team tackled 13 com-plex engineering problems, which are similar to once engi-neering majors would likely see in their first semester in col-lege. The questions require both mathematic and science both mathemanic skills. TEAMS also encourages

team cooperation, cooperative learning strategy, higher order thinking, ecademic rigor and leadership and management skills.

Last year, Harrison placed seventh nationally and 13th in 1991. King believes his team will be in thick of the national rankings this year.

"This year's kids are much more widely versed in math and science as a whole,"King said.

Added student Kristi Bosk-er: "I found it very challenging and I really like the way they made you apply what you learned in your science and math courses to real-life engi-neering problems."

They could each face up to five years in prison and/or a fine of \$2,500 if convicted.

"Being at the scene of an alleged criminal action does not make one criminally liable," said defense attorney Howard Siegrist, adding that the case against the younger bother was circumstantial.
