### Knollenberg, Levin, Kildee reject Black Caucus budget

Eccentric-area members of Congress were recorded on major roll call votes in the week ending March 19

#### HOUSE

Yes on Budget Resolu-tion: By a vote of 243 for and 183 against, the House approved a fiscal 1994 budgand 183 against, the rooted approved a fiscal 1994 budg-et bluepint (H Con Res 64) projecting about \$1.5 trillion in spending, more than \$1.24 trillion in revenue and a deflet of \$253.5 billion. Clinton pledges to lower

No to Republican Al-ternative: By a vote of 135 for and 295 against, the House rejected the leading Republican budget alterna-tive, which avoided tax in-creases and used more ag-gressive spending restraint to achieve \$495 billion in deficit reduction over five years. The GOP plan was more specific and politically bold than the Democratic plan (above) in its cuts, it also differed by mont-leading instead of mainly cuts. It also differed by front-loading Instead of mainly deferring cuts until later years as does the Democratic plan. Supporter Bob Franks, R-N.J., sald the GOP budget

N.J., said the GOP budget would "reduce the oppressive tax burden on the people of America as well as begin to roll back some of the unnecessary spending that has taken place in this city over the

years."
Opponent Howard Berman,
D-Calif., said, "This is truly a
budget with no vision whatsoever. (It) represents the
same tired priorities of the
last 12 years - neglect, supply-side voodoo economics

ply-side voodoe economics and trickle-down mythology." A yes vote supported the Republican budget. Area rep-resentatives voting yes were: Knollenberg. Voting no: Carr, Klidee, Levin and Ford.

No to Black Caucus Budget: The House reject-ed, 87 for and 335 against, the fiscal 1994 budget spon-sored by the 39 Affican-American members of Con-American members of Con-gress who comprise the Con-gressional Black Caucus. It recommended cutting 1994 defense spending by \$11.5 billion more than President Clinton's plan (above) and di-verting most of that savings to social programs. It also went beyond the Clinton plan in taxing corporations and the wealthy. vealthy.

Supporter Kweisi Mfume, D-Md., said the plan was "about investing and then re-ceiving dividends on that in-vestment. So we have a choice to pay now or in fact we can pay later."

Opponent Randy Cunning-ham, R-Calif., said the Black Caucus's deep defense cuts would work to the disadvan-tage of minorities in uniform.

A yes vote was to adopt the Black Caucus budget. the Black Caucus budget.
Area representatives voting
no were: Carr, Kildee, Knol-tenberg, Levin and Ford. Yes on Jobs Bill: 8y a vote of 235 for and 190 against, the House passed President Clinton's short-President Clinton's short-term economic stimulus (HR 1335), which provides \$16.3 billion in new appropriations along with a \$3-billion re-lease from the Highway Trust Fund and \$3.3 billion in new credit for small businesses.

Defined as emergency Defined as emergency spending, the outlays will be added to this year's deficit. The legislation is designed to create up to one million new jobs over the next two years, mostly construction jobs and summer employment for poor youths. It slow will prime the economy with \$4 billion in extended unemployment benefits for the long-term jobless.

Supporter Romano Mazzoli, D-Ky., said the stimulus bill D-Ky., said the stimulus bill was inseparable from the re-mainder of Clinton's econom-

Opponent Gerald Solomon, opponent Gerald Solomon, R-N.Y., termed the "emer-gency" designation a "eu-phemism for spending more of money that we do not have budgeted." A yes vote was to pass the short-term atimulus bill. Area representatives voting yes were: Carr, Kildee, Levin and Ford. Voting no: Knotlenberg.

No to Pay-As-You-Go: By a vote of 181 for and 244 against, the House rejected a Republican bid to put most of the emergency spending in President Clinton's economic stimulus peckage (above) on a pay-as-you-go basis, in keeping with the 1990 Budget Enforcement Act. Republicans sought revenue to offset new appropriations in the bill except the \$4 billion for extended unemployment benefits.

cept the \$4 billion for extend-ed unemployment benefits. Sponsor Joseph McDade, R-Pa., said, "If these pro-grams are so important, I say let us find the offsets... to

let us find the offsets...to pay for them." Opponent Steny Hoyer, D-Md., said "there is an emer-gency" for Americans without jobs, health care and oppor-tunities for their children. A yes vote was to soften the impact of HR 1335 on the deficit. Area representa-

tives voting yes were: Kn lenberg. Voting No: Carr, Kildes, Levin and Ford.

Yes on Consumer Issue: By a vote of 362 for and 38 against, the House passed a bill (HR 965) to chieve better-built bicycle schleve better-built bicycle helmets, warning labels on toys of possible choking hazards, and a minimum diameter of 1.75 inches for balls made for small children. The bill requires the Consumer Product Safety Commission to draft regulations to bring about the safety improvements.

about the safety improvements.

Sponsor Cardiss Collins, D.
III, said the mandate from
Capitol Hill is needed because the product safety
commission "is not living up to its mission to protect
American consumers from
hezardous products."
No opponent spoke
against the bill.
