It's true everything that goes up must come down, but the North Farmington baseball team might make it down in record time.

After a season that saw the Raiders win the Western Lakes Activities Association title and compile a 16-4 overall mark, North's expectations for this season are much lower.

The entire starting lineup from last season is gone. An indication of how North might fare this season? The top returning player had four hits last year.

"I'm not faking it," Horwitz asid. "We lost ail of our starters and return no experience. We have a good nucleus of six players but have nothing around that on our bench. We only have three pitchers.

"This will be a rough season and will be the toughest and most challenging one since I've been here (eight seasons)."

Horwitz does believe the Raiders future looks brighter with the addition of sophomore hurler Darin Glasser, who will start a lot of games.
