Ill David York — A Ford Motor Co. engineer who has served on school-related committees, including several on the district level. He's a member of Advocates of Excellence in Education. "It's just time when I can be of help, and I want to be," York soid. "There's a lot of chillenges and a lot of difficulties ahead."
