School Tax May Reappear; Open Sessions Again Studied

FARMINGTON A proposal to place a tax proposal on the ballot Aug. 30 and another to open study sessions to the public were made at Monday night's Farmington Board of Education meeting. No final decision was made, however, and both will reappear for discussion July 6.

The motion by trustee Ronald Emmitt to put another millage proposal on the ballot was tabled until July 6 to give the board's newest trustee, Mrs. Elizabeth Brennan, a chance to discuss the action.

The motion by Mrs. Kay Stirling asking for open study sessions was defeated 4-3, but the board agreed to discuss the request again at the July 6 meeting.

community is not in favor of additional taxes," said Emmitt, "but we, as board members, have an obligation to students in 1971-72 to give them the same type of education given to the students of 1970-71."

Emmitt expressed hope residents will be able to properly evaluate the effect the 4.5 millage defeat of June 14 will have on students and understand what could happen if the millage requested on Aug. 30 is not approved.

ALDO VAGNOZZI, trustee, said he was against motion because there was a substantial turnout of voters June 14 and the defeat of the millage was equally substantial.

"I have seen no indication since of any shift of viewpoint, and I wonder if we are going to get the same large turnout in August. I'd like to see evidence of a shift in public sentiment before I vote to put it back on the ballot."

"We adequately presented the issue and reached the people with the facts. We said that if the millage was not passed, there would be cuts. We got the message across."

and the majority said to go ahead with the austerity budget, and that's what we should do."

If the majority of the board favors a second millage vote, Vagnozzi added, a budget hearing should be held to get opinions from residents on what can be cut and if the present educational program should be maintained.

"I strongly believe we owe it to the children to go back to the public again," said Mrs. Stirling. "I'm convinced people in Farmington want quality education."

John Washburn III, board chairman, said he was completely in favor of having another "go at it with the community."

Mrs. Brennan said she disagreed with Lichtman that she was elected on the millage issue alone and added that she preferred to "withhold comment at this time as I have chosen not to comment on other issues discussed by the board tonight."

Lichtman then moved to table the motion until July 6. After assurances that there would still be time to place the question on the ballot for Aug. 30 if acted upon July 6, the board voted 7-0 to table.

Beginning next week, July 6, the school board will be meeting on the first and third Tuesdays of each month. The change to Tuesday night was made to allow residents to avoid conflict with Farmington Township board meetings which have been held the same night as school board sessions.

Her motion stated all study sessions would be public except for those dealing with personnel, including items concerning negotiations with unions, and discussions of land acquisition. Land acquisition and personnel items would still be discussed in "executive" (secret) sessions closed to the public.

Trustee Kenneth Perrin said he felt it appropriate to delay action until July 6 when the new board could vote on the question.

Mrs. Stirling kept her motion on the floor, and it was defeated with Stirling.

"I'd like to know her feelings about placing this back on the ballot. If she wishes not to comment, then I'll move to table until July 6 when she'll officially be on the board."

THE PROPOSAL for open "study" sessions appeared to come as a surprise to the board as some trustees were not prepared to discuss the issue.

Mrs. Stirling commented that she didn't go along with the idea of open study sessions when first proposed last year by Vagnozzi but was not prepared to move that sessions be opened to the public.

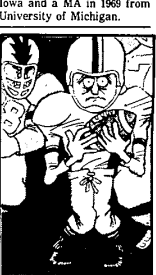
