## Programs showcase talented Latin American musicians



The rich musical heritage of Latin America was an I m p o r t a n t ingredient in two solo recitals in this area recently. The first of these featured Brazilian born planist Flavio Varani, who has been on the fac-

Varani, who has been on the fac-ulty of Oakland University in Ro-chester for many years, and whose many performances have taken him to his native Brazil and to

him to his native Brazil and to Europe.

His April 18 recital at the Jewish Community Center in West Bloomfield was the closing event of the Julius Chajes Music Fund Concert Series.

The second artist was Cuban born Manuel Barrueco, who is currently on the faculty of the Peabody Conservatory. His outstanding contribution to the tradition of classical guitar has made

him a featured guest throughout this continent and Europe, including appearances with some major orchestras and prominent chamber groups. His solo recital, presented as part of the Musica Vivel concert series took place April 23 at the Smith Performing Arts Theater, Oakland Community College Orchard Ridge campus in Farmington Hills.

Of these two artists, Varani is the better known in this area through his frequent appearances here. His latest program featured works by Reynaldo Hahn, Becthoven, Debussy and Villa Lobos. Hahn, who was born in Venezuela and, like Varani, studied in France, is only occasionally featured in this contury his music is tonal with strong ties to the past. His Sonatina in C major has many baroque elements in a contemporary context. Varani was enjoying himself immessly with this light-hearted work, as he did with six seldom played Etudes by

Debussy. He seemed also at home with two selections by Villa Lobos — "Minstrel's Impressions," and "Holiday in the Country, side." The wit and humor of the Debussy Etudes affected the audience like a majic charm.

The one meinstream work on the program — Beethoven's Sonara Op. 110, proved to be the most problematic for Varani. Being the penultimate of Beethoven's 32 sonatas, this work is a challenge to any pianist. The final movement is based on a Bach-like fugue that, with increasing completity, reaches into the stratosphere — but it didn't quite get there in this performance. As several past performances have suggested to me, Varani's strength lies primarily in late Romantic and early 20th century music where his ability can be truly impressive.

The art of classical guitar is invariably associated with the late Andre Segovia and some of his disciples. Manuel Barrueco was

not among these — he studied with Juan Mercadal in Miami, and with Ray de La Torre in New York. His clear and refined style should place him among the elite of the classical guitar tradition.

Some composers on this program were obscure starting with the opening Sulte in D Minor by Silvius Leopold Weiss who was a contemporary of Bach. While it would be hardly supprising that Bach was the greater master, this performance made this obscure work sound like a substantial work.

Other works on the program were by Fernando Sor, Lou Harrison, Chick Corea, Joaquin Rodrison of these are the variations on a Mozart theme by Sor and the Tange and Asturias by Albentz. For those who are accustomed to the flamboyant and amplified to the flamboyant and amplified to the flamboyant and amplified guitar, Barrucco's playing, will

guitar, Barrueco's playing will sound utterly uncharacteristic of the instrument, at least until one gets used to the sound.

His tone is intimate and rather introverted. At first, one would have to strain to hear this sound which seldom would rise above mezzo-forte. However, with this seemingly narrow dynamic range Barrueco is capable if inserting an almost unlimited number of shades and intensities. His music may be analogues to a work of art that may seem like a speck of dust from a distance, but which reveals some most impressive

brilliance and creativity upor

closer scrutiny.

Ordinary guitar players are a dime a dozen, but the art of Manuel Barrueco is a rare treasure among these vast domains.
