To Extend Jobless Benefits: By a vote of 301 for and 114 against, the House appropriated \$4 billion in Immediate deficit spending to provide up to 26 weeks of additional unemployment checks for those who have ex-hausted their initial 26 weeks of benefits. The bill (HR 1335) was sent to President Bill Clinton. It was all that he and congressional Democrats could salvage from a \$19 billion-plus economic stimulus proposal that hours earlier fell vic-

Westmoreland County, Va., that commemorates George Washing-ton's birthpleo. Taxpayers are to supply an estimated \$50,000 to \$100,000 for the land next to Popo's Creek Plantation, where the nation's first president was born in 1732.



Republican Stimulus: By a vote of 53 for and 45 against, the Senate tabled folled) the Republican attermetive to President Clinton's stimulus package (above). The GOP sought to cut the original Clinton requiest by about two-thirds to 56 billion. About \$4 billion was defect spending on extended jobless checks for the long-term unemployed (see House is-sue above). The remaining \$2 billion, to be paid for by unspecified executive branch cuts, was for programs such as highway construction, summer jobs for youth and immunization of children.

To Trim Stimulus: The To Trim Stimulus: The Senate viote 65 for and 46 against to silce \$4.1 billion from President Clinton's \$19 billion-plus economic stimulus package. This trimming railed to make Hit 133 ecceptable to fillbustering Republicans, and Democratic sponsors subsequently abandoned all sections of the bill except \$4 billion for the long-term bobless.
