prime examples of stretching edu-cation dollars, she said.

"There's so much going on and so much to cover, and so little time for teachers and students to get everything they need," Feld-man said. "Instead of cuts, maybe we need to look at ways of being creative."

Intervention and prevention are the best ways to deal with vio-lence in the schools, Feldman said. One idea she suggests is conflict resolution classes and community service for combat-

ants in return for shorter suspen-

ants in return to short sions.

"I think the biggest key, which is crucial to the problem, is parental responsibility and involvement," she said. "These parents have to be responsible for their children's actions and be invalued."
