Local township ready to sue over water charges

West Bloomfield is looking into the possibility the Detroit Water and Sewerage Authority (DWSA) overcharged the township by as much as \$1 million over the last two years.
The overcharges may have occurred, according to auditors from Plante & Moran, when meters registering water sold by DWSA to West Bloomfield incorrectly registered more water than was actually delivered.
The overcharges were not necessarily made intentionally, according to Tom Doescher, an auditor who discussed them with township trustees Monday. More likely, he said, it's a matter of inaccurate meters.
Regardless of how the overcharges occurred, township officials

would not rectify the problem.
"I think we'll probably go to court," said clerk Sharon Law. "But we're not going to let this continue."
The possibility of DWSA overcharging West Bloomfield surfaced Monday following a special board meeting to receive the results of the yearly audit, done this time by Plante & Moran and outlined by accountants Doescher and Joe Heffernan.
Following the meeting on the audit, Doescher and Heffernan met with a town board committee formed to review water and sewer rates. That committee — with trustees Ray Holland, Michael A. Schwartz and Marc Shulman — is reviewing new water and sewer rates that went into effect Jan. 1. Spokesmen for condominium

associations, like Jack Murray of the Drakeshire association, complain those rates are unfair because they force homeowners to pay sewerage fees on water used to sprinkle lawns. Such a charge is unfair, he insists, because homeowners are billed a sewerage

fee for water that does not go into the sewer system.
Those new water rates are not directly linked to any overcharges by DWSA. But they are part of a continuing concern on the part of West Bloomfield — and other suburban communities — about

buying water from the Detroit-run authority.
Possible overcharges have been a concern, said Doescher, for several months. Township representatives have held several discussions with DWSA officials without satisfactory results.

"Every time we try to pinpoint the reason for the overcharge," said Doescher, "they cite a different possible reason."
In March, he said, attorneys for the township sent a lengthy letter to the authority, presumably in preparation for filing suit.
