Adoption guides at hand

The first in a series of guide-books to assist communities in supporting adoptive families has been published by the state Do-partment of Mental Health. "The first guidebook, "Let's Gelbrate Adoption — A Guido for the Jowish Community," was written by Carolyn Flanders McPherson of East Lansing. "Copies are available through Spaulding for Children, a South-Field-based organization which is a national resource center on adoption. "We have been working actively for a number of years to support adoption programs," said Jamos K. Haveman Jr., state mental health director. "We are aware of a large num-ber of children, many with emo-tional or developmental problems, " who have been adopted by Michi-gen families," said Haveman. "We also know there are a num-ber of families and single people who are interested in adoption. "The new series of guideboots on adoption, written particularly for members of different religious or cultural groups, should help to clarify adoption insues and pro-vide helpful tips about how all of us can assist adoptive families," said Haveman. McPherson said the finished work represents the collaboration of more than 30 Jewish leaders in Michigan.
