STUART D. RODGERS

Mr. Rodgers, 74 of Franklin died May 14 at his home.

Born in Detroit, he was employed by a number of local architectural firms during his career

and contributed to the completion of such buildings as the Renaissance Center, MacGregor Building at Wayne State, the World Trade Center in New York, Woodrow Wilson Library in Princeton and the Seattle Space Needle.

Mr. Rodgers worked with many of the "architectural greats" — Eero and Eilii Saarinen and Minoru Yamasaki. He was actively involved in historic preservation as well as principal architect with the restoration of the Port Huron Capitol Building, the Marx House in Wyandotte, the Broughton House in Franklin and the Guardian Building in Detroit.

He retired in April as the federal architect for the state of Michigan with the General Services Administration.

He served in the U.S. Air Force during World War II and retired with the rank of full colonel after 30 years of reserve and active duty. An officer with the Eisenhower staff in England, he participated in the D-Day operation, and often spoke of the agonizing wait for the weather to clear so the gliders could be launched.


He was a member of the AIA, Barbers Lodge of the Masons, Retired Officers Association, Franklin Community Church and Franklin Historical Commission and Historic Society of which he was past president.

Mr. Rodgers served as Franklin's building official and two terms as village trustee.

Survivors include his wife, Virginia; daughters, Judith Gould and Sarah Catton; three step-daughters, Barbara, Ann and Dana DeSerham; and 11 grandchildren.

Private graveside services were conducted at the Franklin Cemetery, followed by a memorial service at the Franklin Community Church.
