### HONORED SCHOLAR

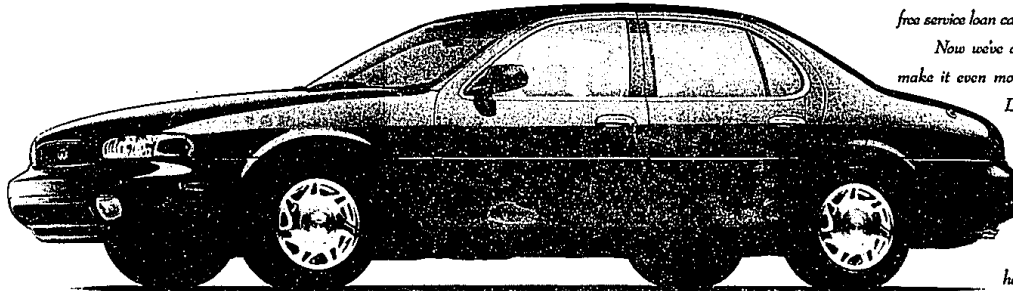
