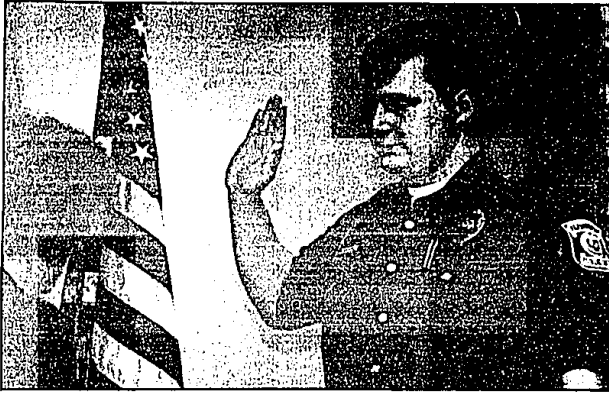

HAVING ARTHRITIS AND FEELING 'LAZY'

Others may chide you for letting your arthritis "get the best of you." They criticize you for not getting out and for acting lazy. What outsiders do not understand is that arthritis causes more than painful joints; arthritis creates fatigue.

In part, fatigue represents strain on your uninfected joints as they try to compensate for arthritic ones. In part, the tiredness is a message from involved joints which may look alright but are closer to their "end" than you realize. In part, fatigue comes from chemical changes generated by the inflammation associated with arthritis itself.

The message of fatigue you must slow down. Arthritic joints need rest. A strained body requires rest, and therapy for inflammation includes being immobilized. People who urge you to go out, may act from good motives, but provide you bad advice.

No state of mind can override fatigue. At best, medicine can slow the intensity of inflammation that accompanies your arthritis. Thus, you must ignore those who say arthritides is merely an attitude, a reduction of a lack of will. You feel tired because you are. In time, you must not act on the admonitions of others but on the information you receive from yourself.
