Cable channel lineup shuffled for local cities

MetroVision has announced a change to its channel lineup in its Redford, Livonie, and Oakland County systems. The Oakland County system covers Farmington, Farmington Hills and Novi. In Livonie and Oakland County, WADL-TY, Channel 38, from Mt. Clemens, will be added to the system as of June 2. WADL features prime time movies, religious programs and home shopping, among other viewing options. It will be on Channel 19 on each

wADL is being added because of the new "must carry' rules which are part of the federal 1992 Cable Act, MetroVision officials said. In order to make room for WADL, MetroVision will be removing WWOR-TV, from Secaucus, N.J., from the system as of June 1.

MetroVision has, for many years, been the only cable operator in southeast Michigan to carry three superstations, officials said.

However, other parts of the new legislation make it fiscally impossible to continue carrying all three, officials said. WWOR is being deleted because it consistently ranked less popular than WTBS and WGN in viewer preference sures.

In Redford Township, WADL
is already on the system. WWOR
will be deleted from Channel 19
as of June 1, and WADL will be
moved from Channel 22 to Channel 19 as of June 2.

Tom Bjorklund, MetroVision's Tom Bjorklund, MetroVision's vice president and regional manager, said, "We find it unfortunate that we will no longer be carrying WWOR due to increased copyright charges atemming from re-cent federal legislation. We also hope that many of our customers find something of interest on WADL."
