# Family, police work to put murder-suicide to rest

Hiding under her bed, Janette Madsen's 15-year-old daughter told the 911 operator on Wednesday, "My mother's just been shot .... several times."

"Who did it?" the operator asked.

"Who did it?"

"All think my dad."

Police played the tape of the 540 a.m. call from the home on Paciocco Court in Plymouth Township for reporters on Thursday— just hours after Madsen's estranged husband, Donald, committed suicide after a police standoff in Northville.

Donald Madsen, 41, told police over his cellular phone on Wednesday he'd shot his wife, a teacher, over a custody fight. The couple was in court seeking a divorce.

After locating him in his condo on Seven Mile Road near Shelmon, care police surrounded the unit, cut off his phone and electricity, and eventually found him dead in his Cadillac after he shot bimself.

Don Tappan, Janette Madsen brother, said after the standoff, "We're all relieved it's over."

"The children can grieve the loss of their parents and get on with their lives," he said Thursday. "They're still basically in shock; we've had a few tears."

Asked if Donald Madsen had demonstrated behavior that as greated he could murder, Tappan said no.

Not long after the shooting, po-lice were able to determine he was in a three-mile radius north of Plymouth—even though he told some friends over his cellular, phone that he was at unother resi-dence in Brighton.

Had visitation rights

"He had spent three weeks with the children in Australia in November 1992," Jackson sald, adding Madsen also had weekly visitation rights.

It was 5:30 c.m. Thursday after an all-night stand-off with police that they found Donald Madsen had used a gun to kill himself as he had killed his estranged wife Janette 24 hours earlier in Plymouth Township.

In between the two shooting, Madsen admitted to his wife's shooting in calls to local police and to Detroit television station TV-2.

A crying Madsen told a Detroit TV anchorman from his condomi-TV anchorman from his condomi-nium in Northville Township, "I died eight months ago, when the divorce started."

In February, she said, police were called to the house during a domestic dispute the couple were having.

In talking with the victim in recent days, "She said (her husband) had just lost his job and was going to do something." Krause said. He was reportedly the manager of a Livonia electronics firm.

Krause said the victim told her that by the divorce agreement, she was to leave by June 2.

Of the shooting, Krause said, "I really was not surprised; he liked to torment her."

Krause said the husband once took the victim's Ford Explorer, leaving her with no transportation.

"He said it wasn't operating; then for three days in a row, he revved it in her driveway," Krause aid.

The victim told the neighbors that to further torment her, her husband had cut telephone wires and had taken everything with him when he moved out.
