Waders rescue Rouge

The coldest weather recorded for the Rouge River Rescue didn't chill the spirits of the more than 100 volunteers who lent a hand Saturday at a southern city site.

"Public awareness has made a difference," said Jean Barrett, assistant to the director of public services. "People are thinking twice about pitching their refrigerators and water heaters. Property owners are (more) responsible."

Falling obstructions out of the Rouge River speeds water flow, allowing the river to cleanse itself.

Every year the cities of Farmington and Farmington Hills study the worst tributary areas still needing resuscitation.

Friends of the Rouge annually look for volunteers. This year's site was near the Farmington Nursing Home at Folsom and Tuck — the same as last year.

In choosing a site, access by heavy equipment is a consideration. "We filled two 30-yarders," Barrett, a five-year city employee, said.
