Packard had asked the Campus Development and Environment Committee of the University Sen-ate to consider the university's existing smoking/no smoking pol-icy in light of concerns raised by various members of the campus community.

The current policy had permitted smoking in private offices, public hallways, all private residential spaces, certain designated smoking lounges, and portions of food service establishments.

Oakland University in Rochester has expanded its no smoking special occasions like private special occasions like private functions, social functions, soc

private rooms. The Senate would have benned smoking in all student rooms.

The university already has a smoke-free residence hall and certain amoke-free floors in other halls. Packard said. She said other smoke-free spaces will be designated without prohibiting smoking in all residence hall rooms in response to student requests.

The specific wording of the policy follows: Smoking is posibilited in all enclosed areas of Dakland University campus except in:

A. Private residences (including residence hall rooms when designated by the president).

B. Spaces specifically designated by the president.

The president or a designee for such purposes as special or private functions, research, or performance where smoking is part of the performances.






