Michael Wiggins, a 13-year veteran of the department, is the new deputy director, succeeding Gary Gass, who was officially named as public safety director in April.

Maria Putt, a public safety officer for 10 years, has been promoted to commander, and Robert Schulz has been elevated to the rank of public safety officer I.

The presonnel moves conclude six months of changes in the department, which started back in January when then-public safety department director Frank Lauhoff became city manager.

"I'm very anxious to learn the posi-tion," Wiggins said. "I's like starting a new job. But I have the benefit of having a support network, since I know the people here."

Wiggins is in charge of operations, supervising all three shifts as well as special operations such as fire and the detective bureau. He's also the community liaison, handling resident complaints and dealing with the me-dia.

Wiggins, 37, has been with the de-partment since September 1979. He worked with the Westland Police De-partment for a year prior to that.

He was promoted to PSO I in 1983 and to commander the following year. He also served as fire marshal from 1985-88.
"Ho's been a real asset to the de-partment," Goss said. "He's a hard worker. Certainly with his back-ground and expertise, he'll be a good operations commander."

Wiggins is a graduate of Dearborn Divine Child. He has an associate's degree from Henry Ford Community College and a bachelor's degree from Madonna University, both in criminal justice.
He's nearly completed his master's degree in criminal justice at Michigan State University. He is also a graduate of the highly regarded Northwestern University School of Police Staff & Command.
