The City of Farmington Summer 1993 Property Tax Statement is payable from July 1, 1993 through August 31, 1993 without penalty. 4% penalty added on September 1, 1993. Treasurer's Office will be open for payment of Taxes from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday with the following exception:

Monday, July 5, 1993 CLOSED ALL DAY

A depository is located in the City Hall lobby. Applications for deferment of 1993 taxes are available at the City of Farmington Treasurer's office. If your income for 1992 did not exceed \$25,000 and you are a paraplegic, quadriplegic, senior citizen, eligible serviceman, eligible widow, blind, or totally or permanently disabled, your application must be filed with the City of Farmington Treasurer's office not later than September 14, 1993. Deferred Summer Taxes may be paid without penalty until February 28, 1994. By law, if the last day for payment falls on a Saturday, Sunday, or legal holiday, the last day will be extended to include the next day which is not a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday.
