 The League of Women Voters is broadening the scope of that which they provide educationally. A new monthly television show is entitled "Oakland Voter." Produced by Shelley Paros and Mary J. Butti and hosted by Steve Barnaby and Debbie Mason, the program lends energy and intellectual content to each subject.

The initial discussion on the programs are to provide local and state news. Several of the subjects reflect the league's interest in environmental issues such as Preserving Lakes, Urban Nature Areas, Wild Life Sanctuaries as well as Environmental Adjustments.

The league's resourceful team have become knowledgeable on how the rules of Cable Television Community Access work from system to system so that they may avail themselves of several television facilities.

One of the most prevalent guidelines is that the producer and crew must be local residents of the cable franchise and must be certified upon the equipment. Because the league's membership is so far reaching their technical options open up considerably.

from Calvin Coolidge tacked on the walls to give the area a personal touch.

Ward draws the line, though, at empty pop cans and lunch leftovers.

"There are people who are slobs, who have Pepsi cans or food . . . Then there are people who have work strewn all over," Ward said.

Mary Bush, an executive assistant and associate broker for Farmington Hills Realtors in Thompson-Hills, considers herself in the latter category of the organizationally impaired.

Mounds of paperwork have nearly engulfed her as well as her desk. She said it's part of the real

estate business, where no two days are alike.

"I always have people asking me when I'm going to clean things up," Bush said. "My response is, 'I'm working on it and there never seems to be enough hours in the day.'"

"If you have a messy desk, you'll always hear, 'Oh, what a mess. How do you find anything?' But you do."

Added Ward: "I lose stuff. I know it's here. It's just a matter of if it's been filed or in one of the piles."

Merry Beth Oliveto lays claim to one of the most untidy desks at The Farmington Branch Library. A week-old empty can of soup is

the first clue. . . . I want to take it home to be recycled," said Oliveto, a children's librarian.
