Library plan set for Aug. 10 vote

Voters in the Farmington Com-munity Library district will vote on a proposed tax that would au-thorize a bond issue of up to \$15.5 million to build a new 80,000-square-foot library on the city-owned McMahon property, on the

east side of Orchard Lake Road, south of I-696 across from the Oakland Community College Orc-hard Ridge Campus entrance.

The election is scheduled for Tuesday, Aug. 10.

The new Dynix system will help ease some of the space crunch by allowing people to access the library's card catalog from their home or office 24 hours a day. In addition, an enhancement purchased by the Friends of the Library for \$15,000 will allow the public to check indexes of journal articles by subject and should be operational by September.

We've had whopping success "We've had whopping success this year at getting new mem-bers," Greenberg said. "We've had about 250 new members join since May I. We had a citywide solicitation. Basically, that's where a lot of our funds come from."

Greenberg said the Friends number about 1,200. Most, like Greenberg, have more than a passing interest in providing a first-class library system.

"We have a lot of families with young children," she said. "I don't believe that my three children would have been able to accomplish what they have without this library. They are all U-M graduates and one is going for a doctorate at MT. The library was like a second home for them."

Another new feature of the li-brary's computer system will be an information and referral/com-nunity resources module that will allow anyone with a computer and modem to find out about ser-vices offered through more than 100 organizations in the Farming-ton area. Information about or-canizations and a calendar of ganizations and a calendar of events will be accessible begin-ning in September.


