

First wife inquires about ex-husband

Q. My hus-band and I were divorced many years ago. He remarried a n 23

years ago. He remarried a woman 23 years younger than himsolf. He died a couple of years younger than himsolf. He died a couple of years ago. He could collect more on my Social Security. We have been married six years and I was told that you must be married at years and reast 10 years in order to collect the extra benefits. His second wife is too young to get the money and I am the one who had and raised his children. I don't understand why there must be a 10-year limit.

A. If you are 60 years of age or older and not married, you are ellgible to collect additional monies on yor Social Security. In fact, if succeeding wives are also over 60 they are entitled to collect the same additional amount also.

While I can understand your point concerning the amount of years you must have been married, the law, at this time, clearly states that the marriage had to have lasted for at least 10 years. Until recently the law required that the marriage lasted 20 years. I honestly do not know how the lawmakers arrived at the 10-year figure but it has been changed once, and perhaps if enough peo-

A. It is perfectly legal to ask for a pet deposit in a subsidized apart-ment building. That, of course, is to cover any damage that the pet may cause.

The government has stated that the required deposit may be up to \$300, so the amount of the deposit

can be determined by the managers of the apartment units as long as it does not exceed \$300. Should the pet die or you move, the deposit is to be returned, providing that the animal has not caused any damage to the building.

Q. You frequently write about women collecting on their husband's Social Security. Are you aware that men can collect on their wives' benefits as well? I am still working but my wife is not and I get part of her Social Security.

Security.

A. I stand corrected. You are absolutely right. Men can collect on their wives' Social Security. Social Security looks at all records, regardless of gender, and will pay a full, unreduced rate if the husband is more than 70 years of age and still working, regardless of the amount of money the male spouse earns. If the husband is under 70 there are earning limitations. When the male spouse retires, Social Security will pay on the highest earned income but it will pay on both apouses' earnings at the same time. at the same time.
