Men are digging the European bent as well, with sales at Michigan's 13 Structure stores "growing steadily."

"Our best-selling items have been our original six-button knit polos, our linen collection, and our authentic silk ties," said Jeffrey Moran, Structure spokesman.

"New for fall at Structure are vests with big bold stripes, plaids and patterned sweaters, — all done in our generous, relaxed fit signature styling."

In addition to Structure and Express (aka Compagnie Internationale Express), other divisions of the Limited Inc. include Lerner New York, Lane Bryant, Victoria's Secret, Limited Too, Abercrombie & Fitch, Henri Bendel, Cacique, Bath & Body Works, and Penhaligon's.

Sales records are most impressive, the company reports, from the shops selling "clothing with a distinctly European point-of-view."

"In these stores we want our customers to feel as if they'd just stepped into a boutique along Paris' Left Bank," said former Express president Michael Weiss, recently promoted to vice president of the Limited Inc.

"Two looks on the subject of dressing European, both authored

by fashion journalist Susan Sommers, are selling like crepes suzettes. "Italian Chic" published in the fall, is being marketed direct through ads in all the Condé Nast fashion magazines this month. Toll-free number operator "Rose," said sales are "great."

"Italian Chic" has led readers to seek out "French Chic," published in 1988 also by Villard Books, New York.

"Stroll through the streets of Paris and almost every woman you see has put herself together in a smart, alluring, original way with a special touch that sets her apart," Sommers writes. "French women have something special. They're feminine, sure of themselves, and seem to delight in breaking all fashion rules, yet making it all work."

In "Italian Chic" Sommers writes "Italian women know that chic means more than just a pretty dress. It's a pulled together look that makes people remember the woman, not just the clothes."

Both books contain photographs, tips, ideas and interviews with European women who have mastered certain looks.

Annette King of Detroit, recently returned from a trip to Paris and discussed her impressions of the European mystique while shopping for shoes at Twelve Oaks Mall.

"The women all looked so good," she said. "Even those begging in the streets were what seemed to me, designer clothing. There is truly something to admire about the way French women turn out."
