"Even if we had 20 candidates, we wouldn't have a primary." Doman said. "That was something that the voters decided to aboilsh six years ago. They decided that it just wann't worth it." As Farmington's Aug. 13 filing deadline approaches, no candidate has taken out petitions, said clerk/treasurer Patay Cantrell. Council members Richard Tupper, Arnie Campbell and Shirley Richardson are up for reselection. Voters in the Farmington Library District will go to the polleday, 10 for a special election. Voters will decide whether to approve a \$15.5 million bond issue to build and equip a new library on Orchard Lake Road across from Oakland Community College's Orchard Ridge campus and whether to approve a levy of 1.1 millio over 20 years for library operations.
